ANNUAL REPORT 2002/2003

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Foreword

This is the thirteenth annual report of the Western Australian Boxing Commission.

The professional boxing industry re-emerged during 2002/2003 with five professional boxing promotions taking place in Perth.

Members of the Commission attended all five promotions and reported that there were some good quality bouts between local, interstate and overseas contestants. However concerns were raised as to the appropriateness of some venues for the conduct of professional boxing and the appearance of a range of mixed martial arts.

The 2002/2003 year saw the passing through State Cabinet of the Boxing Control Amendment Bill which will expand the scope of the Commission to include professional martial arts. The new Act will be called the Professional Combat Sports Act and the Commission will be called the Professional Combat Sports Commission.

Membership of the Professional Combat Sports Commission will be increased to eight with the two new members having knowledge of professional martial arts.

The Executive Officer of the Commission, Peter Gibson, was the State representative on the committee looking into safety in combat sport and a more national approach to the administration of the industry in Australia, a move that is supported by the Commission.

The year also saw the departure of the Executive Officer of the Commission, Mr Peter Gibson and Mr Rob Clement, both of who have been promoted to other areas. Mr Gibson's replacement will be Mr Ray Smith and Mr Clement's position will be filled by Mr Greg McLennan from the Department of Sport and Recreation.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the Commission members for their work during the year, and on behalf of the members, express the Commission's appreciation to the Department of Sport and Recreation for the support it provided.

- Establishing standards for the training of persons involved in boxing.
- Providing protection for all those involved in professional boxing be they promoters, boxers or other industry participants.
- Ensuring the physical safety of professional boxers.
- Advising the Minister for Sport and Recreation on boxing matters.

Relevant Legislation

Enabling Legislation

The Western Australian Boxing Commission was established as a statutory authority under Section 4 of the Boxing Control Act 1987.

Legislation Impacting on the Western Australian Boxing Commission's Activities

In performance of its functions, the Western Australian Boxing Commission complies with the following relevant written laws:

- Equal Opportunity Act 1984
- Disability Services Act 1993
- Financial Administration and Audit Act 1985
- State Records Act 2000

Responsible Minister

The Hon Alan Carpenter MLA, Minister for Education, Indigenous Affairs and Sport and Recreation.

Activities and Responsibilities

The Commission's primary responsibility is to carry out the functions of the Boxing Control Act 1987.

In carrying out these functions, the Commission is responsible for:

- Developing guidelines for proper standards in professional boxing.
- Establishing standards for the training of persons involved in boxing.
- Receiving applications from persons wishing to register as boxers.
- Maintaining the register of boxers in Western Australia.
- Issuing and receiving certificates of registration.
- Serving notices of cancellation, suspension or alteration to the registration of boxers.
- Imposing disciplinary provisions on boxers.
- Maintaining register of industry participants and issuing certificates of participation.
- Issuing and reissuing medical registration books to boxers.
- Receiving applications for and issuing Boxing Contest permits.
- Inquiring into the validity of boxing contests.
- Attending and officiating at all weigh-ins.

Summary:

Currently the Act provides for and the Boxing Commission ensures that professional boxing has a minimum standard that allows promoters and other participants to understand and create a safe and professional environment conducive to boxing.

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1 Significant accounting policies

The following accounting policies have been adopted in the preparation of the financial statements. Unless otherwise stated, these policies are consistent with those adopted in the previous year.

General Statement

The financial statements constitute a general purpose financial report which has been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards, Statements of Accounting Concepts and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board, and Urgent Issues Group (UIG) Consensus Views as applied by the Treasurer's Instructions. Several of these are modified by the Treasurer's Instructions to vary application, disclosure, format and wording. The Financial Administration and Audit Act and the Treasurer's Instructions are legislative provisions governing the preparation of financial statements and take precedence over Australian Accounting Standards, Statements of Accounting Concepts and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board, and UIG Consensus Views. The modifications are intended to fulfil the requirements of general application to the public sector, together with the need for greater disclosure and also to satisfy accountability requirements.

If any such modification has a material or significant financial effect upon the reported results, details of that modification and where practicable, the resulting financial effect, are disclosed in individual notes to these financial statements.

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting using the historical cost convention.

(a) Grants Revenue

Grants are recognised as revenue when the Commission obtains control over the assets comprising the contributions, or when the grant has been approved by the Department of Sport and Recreation.

Revenue from registrations and permits are recognised when the Commission receives the appropriate fee.

(b) Cash

For the purpose of the Statement of Cash Flows, cash includes cash assets and restricted cash assets. These include short-term deposits that are readily convertible to cash on hand and are subject to insignificant risk of changes in value.

(c) Receivables

Receivables are recognised at the amounts receivable as they are due for settlement no more than 30 days from the date of recognition.

Collectability of receivables is reviewed on an ongoing basis. Debts which are known to be uncollectable are written off. A provision for doubtful debts is raised where some doubts as to collection exists.

(d) Payables

Payables, including accruals not yet billed, are recognised when the Commission becomes obliged to make future payments as a result of a purchase of assets or services. Payables are generally settled within 30 days.

(e) Outputs

The Commission has only one output, being: "To ensure that contestants and officials taking part in professional contests can do so with reasonable confidence that the risks of contracting disease from bodily fluids are minimal and that their contract with the promoter will be fulfilled".

Accordingly, separate reports by output are not produced.

(f) Western Australian Boxing Commission Prize Money and Suspended Postings Accounts

Statements have not been prepared for the Western Australian Boxing Commission Prize Money Account and Suspended Postings Account as the balance of these accounts at the end of the financial year was nil (2001/2002: Nil).

(g) Members benefits

Superannuation

Members of the Commission become non-contributory members of the West State Superannuation Scheme, an accumulation fund complying with the Commonwealth Government's Superannuation Guarantee (Administration) Act 1992. This scheme is administered by the Government Employees Superannuation Board (GESB).

The liability for superannuation charges under the West State Superannuation Scheme is extinguished by payment of employer contributions to the GESB.

(h) Resources Received Free of Charge or For Nominal Value

Resources received free of charge or for nominal value which can be reliably measured are recognised as revenues and as assets or expenses as appropriate at fair value.

(i) Comparative Figures

Comparative figures are, where appropriate, reclassified so as to be comparable with the figures presented in the current financial year.

(j) Rounding of amounts

Amounts in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.
