REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2008

Pursuant to Section 25 of the *Chiropractors Act 2005*, I report hereunder on the Board's activities for the year 2008/2009.

1. CONSTITUTION

The Chiropractors Registration Board of Western Australia is established by the Chiropractors Act 2005 (the Act) which was proclaimed on 3 July 2007. The Board is a body corporate and exercises the powers, authorities, duties and functions imposed on it by the Act and Rules determined from time to time.

2. GOALS

The primary goals of the Board area

- a) to ensure the administration of the Act; and
- b) protect the public from any unprofessional, improper or incompetent practice of chiropractic.

3. FUNCTIONS OF THE BOARD

The Board is directly responsible to the Minister for Health for all matters relating to the administration of the *Chiropractors Act 2005* and the *Chiropractors Regulations 2007* (the Rules).

The functions of the Board are:-

- (a) to advise the Minister on matters to which this Act applies,
- (b) to administer the scheme of registration under Part 4;
- (c) to support and promote public education and research in relation to the practice of chiropractic;
- (d) to monitor education in chiropractic, and provide advice on that education to the Minister and to any other person or body involved in that education;
- (e) to promote and encourage
 - (i) the continuing education of chiropractors in the practice of chiropractic; and
 - (ii) increased levels of skill, knowledge and competence in the practice of chiropractic;
- (f) to perform other functions that are conferred on the Board under this Act or any other Act.

4. MEMBERSHIP OF THE BOARD

Membership of the Board is prescribed under Section 6 of the Act.

The Board consists of 8 members appointed by the Minister, of whom —

- (a) 6 are to be chiropractors;
- (b) one is to be a person who has knowledge of and experience in representing the interests of consumers; and
- (c) one is to be a legal practitioner.

Each member of the Board is to be a natural person.

10. AMENDMENTS TO THE ACT AND RULES

10.1 Act & Rules

The Chiropractors Act 2005 was proclaimed on 3 July 2007.

10.2 State Administration Tribunal

With effect from January 2005 a new State Government tribunal has taken over some of the disciplinary functions of the Board.

The creation of the new tribunal will deal with the determination of Inquiries, the appeal process, dispute resolution and handling of professional disciplinary matters.

10.3 State Records Act 2000

Under Section 19 of the State Records Act 2000 the Board is required to have a Record Keeping Plan ("RKP") in place. The RKP provides an accurate reflection of the record keeping program of the Board and must be complied with by the Board and its staff.

The RKP for the Board has been approved by the State Records Commission until 2009.

In accordance with Standard 2 Principle 6 of the Act:

- The efficiency and effectiveness of the Board's record keeping systems are evaluated on a regular basis and will be evaluated at the time of the review of the RKP.
- 2. The Board conducts a recordkeeping training program for staff involved in records management, covering topics such as the Board's obligations under the Act, procedures regarding creation, management and disposal of records.

- 3. The efficiency and effectiveness of the record keeping training program is reviewed every 6 months.
- The Board's induction program addresses employees' roles and responsibilities in regard to their compliance with the RKP.

10.4 Freedom of Information

Part 5 of the Freedom of Information Act 1992 requires the Board to prepare, publish and maintain an up to date Information Statement.

Copies of the Information Statement can be obtained from the Board's office free of charge or can be downloaded from the Board's website.

No requests for release of information under the Freedom of Information Act have been received by the Board during the year.

11. PENALTIES

The penalties which the Board may impose on registered chiropractors are reprimand, suspension, cancellation of licence or order the chiropractor to pay a penalty not exceeding \$5,000.

12. COMPLAINTS

During the year the Board dealt with a number of new complaints against registered chiropractors.

- One (1) complaint in relation to advertising on a chiropractor's letterhead where the chiropractor was holding himself out to be a specialist.

 (This matter is currently under investigation.)
- One (1) complaint in relation to a chiropractor acting improperly in the course of practise as a chiropractor.

 (This matter is currently under investigation.)
- One (1) complaint in relation to a chiropractor not complying with the condition of registration to hold Professional Indemnity Insurance.

 (This matter is currently being investigated.)
- One (1) complaint in relation to a myopractor advertising in the yellow pages under the Chiropractors section.
 (This matter is currently being investigated.)
- One (1) SAT application made in relation to a Chiropractor over servicing patients. (Matter is closed.)
- One (1) SAT application made in relation to a Chiropractor over servicing patients. (This matter is currently being investigated.)
- One (1) complaint made in relation to a Chiropractor holding himself out to be a specialist.

(This matter was investigated by the Board and due to the Chiropractors undertaking and instructions to his staff the Board did not take further action. The matter is closed.)

• One (1) complaint made in relation to a Chiropractors advertisement in a local paper.

(This matter was investigated by the Board and no further action was warranted. The matter is closed.)

13. CONFERENCES AND MEETINGS

The Australian Conference of Chiropractors Registration Boards (ACCRB) Conference was held in Perth on 22 and 23 August 2009. The Board was represented at the Conference by Dr B Goodreid, Dr A Scott, Dr A Powlesland, Dr D Herron and Mr C Emmott.

Among the items considered at the ACCRB Conference are:-

- National Registration
- Student Tracking Programme
- Registration Guidelines and Policies National Standards for the National Board

14. COUNCIL ON CHIROPRACTIC EDUCATION AUSTRALASIA

The Council on Chiropractic Education Australasian Inc (CCEA) was incorporated on 27 February 2003.

The main functions of the CCEA are;

- to undertake accreditations in relation to Australian and New Zealand Chiropractic Programs; and
- to undertake competency assessments of overseas trained chiropractors to ensure they are safe and competent to practise in Australia and New Zealand.

The Council has the following objects contained within its Constitution and Rules:

- to assess and accredit chiropractic undergraduate and postgraduate courses;
- to advise and make recommendations regarding statutory accreditation, approval or prescription;
- to develop, advocate and maintain valid and reliable accreditation standards of processes to assess the suitability and quality of chiropractic courses and to judge the success of provider institutions in ongoing development, implementation and evaluation of those course goals and outcomes;
- to develop and conduct competency assessments and advise on the suitability of chiropractors to practise in Australasia;
- to advise and make recommendations in relation to chiropractic education and uniform standards of practice and regulation of chiropractors in Australasia;
- to establish and maintain relationships with bodies or organisations in other countries having objects and functions, in whole or in part, similar to the objects and function of the Council; and
- to ensure that the Council achieves its purpose and objects.

The current membership of the Council is as follows, with each member nominating a Councillor to represent it:

- the Chiropractors and Osteopaths Board of the Australian Capital Territory;
- the Chiropractic Board of New Zealand;
- the Chiropractors and Osteopaths Board of the Northern Territory;
- the Chiropractors Board of Queensland;
- the Chiropractors Board of South Australia;
- the Chiropractors and Osteopaths Board of Tasmania;
- the Chiropractors Registration Board of Victoria;
- the Chiropractors Board of Western Australia;
- the Chiropractors Association of Australia;
- the New Zealand Chiropractic Association;

or each of their successors in law.

The Council's membership also includes two nominated Councillors representing Australian and New Zealand Chiropractic Teaching Institutions and two laypersons.

15. MURDOCH UNIVERSITY

A chiropractic course was established at Murdoch University in 2003. The Board has recently finalised working with representatives from the Chiropractic School of Murdoch University and from the CAA (WA branch) on developing Fieldwork Placement Guidelines for students. The Registrar has been requested on an annual basis by the Chiropractic School at Murdoch to present to the first year and final year students on aspects of the Act and Rules.

1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, Australian Accounting Interpretations and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the requirements of the Chiropractors Act 2005.

The financial report covers the Chiropractors Registration Board of Western Australia as an individual entity. The Board is incorporated in Western Australia under the Chiropractors Act 2005.

The financial report was authorised for issue in accordance with a resolution of the Board on 20 November 2009.

The financial report of the Chiropractors Registration Board of Western Australia complies with all applicable Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (AIFRS) in their entirety. Compliance with AIFRS ensures that the financial report, comprising the financial statements and notes thereto, complies with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS).

The following is a summary of the basis of preparation and the material accounting policies adopted by the Board in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Significant Accounting Judgements, Estimates and Assumptions

The Board has not made any significant accounting judgements, estimates or assumptions in the process of applying the Board's accounting policies for the year

Reporting Basis and Conventions

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs modified by the revaluation of selected non-current assets, and financial liabilities for which the fair value basis of accounting has been applied.

Accounting Policies

a) Income and Expense Recognition

Licence fees are brought-to account as income on a time expiry basis under the accruals method of accounting.

Expenses are brought to account under the accruals method of accounting in the year incurred.

b) Taxation

The income of the Chiropractors Registration Board of Western Australia is exempt from tax pursuant to Section 24AQ of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (cont.)

c) Goods and Services Tax

Revenue and expenditure is stated net of the amount of the goods and services tax (GST). The Australian Taxation Office has advised and ruled that registration fees are exempt from GST. The Board, however, pays GST on its supplies and obtains credit refunds quarterly upon lodgement of its Business Activity Statement.

d) Registrars Fees Expense

This expenditure represents the Board's administration and secretarial fees budgeted and approved by the Board and paid as a retainer for year ended 30 June 2009. It includes the provision of fully serviced office facilities such as management and administration together with accounting, secretarial staff, typing, computer facilities, telephone attendance, reception, public access, rental for office space and meeting facilities, newsletter, educational presentations, attendance at professional conventions and sub-committee meetings.

e) Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purposes of the Cash Flow Statement, cash includes cash at banks and investments in money market instruments.

9. SEGMENT REPORTING

The Board operates as a statutory registration body within Western Australia.

10. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

a) Interest Rate Risk

The Board is not exposed to any significant interest rate risk since cash balances are maintained at variable rates and borrowings of the board are not considered significant.

b) Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk arises from the possibility that the board might encounter difficulty in settling its debts or otherwise meeting its obligations related to financial liabilities. The board manages risk through the following mechanisms:

- pre-paring forward-looking cash flow analysis in relation to its operational, investing and financing activities;
- only investing surplus cash with major financial institutions; and
- proactively monitoring the recovery of unpaid subscriptions.

f) Financial Risk Management

The Board meets on a regular basis to analyse financial risk exposure and to evaluate treasury management strategies in the context of the most recent economic conditions and forecasts.

The committee's overall risk management strategy seeks to assist the Board in meeting its financial targets, whilst minimising potential adverse effects on financial performance.

Risk management policies are approved and reviewed by the Board on a regular basis. These include the use of credit risk policies and future cash flow requirements.

11. CAPITAL MANAGEMENT

Year Ended 30 June 2009

Following the proclamation of the Chiropractors Act 2005, in accordance with section 49(1) the Complaints Assessment Committee was appointed by the Board on 15 May 2007.

The following Board Members were appointed to the Committee:

Dr Doug Herron - elected under section 50(2)(a). Ms Fiona Vernon - elected under section 50(2)(b) Dr Rachel Young - elected under section 50(2)(c)

Ms Vernon was appointed Chairman of the Committee.

Complaints Received

As at 1 July 2008 there were 3 complaints which were under investigation by the Complaints Assessment Committee.

During the period under review 3 complaints were received.

The Complaints Assessment Committee met to consider the complaints on hand on the following occasions:

12 February 2009 19 March 2009 17 June 2009.

Complaints Considered

Of the complaints on hand and received during the year, the following were finalised:

(a) a complaint in relation to a chiropractor advertising in a local newspaper with the advertisement appearing to be misleading or deceptive.

After considering the chiropractors response to the complaint the Board was satisfied with the chiropractors explanation and accordingly determined that no further action be taken in relation to this matter.

(b) a complaint that a chiropractor held himself out to be a paediatric chiropractor when the chiropractor does not hold a specialist qualification.

The Committee determined that no further action be taken in relation to the matter on the basis of the chiropractor's assurance that he did not hold himself out to be a specialist and undertaking to ensure his staff did not suggest he has a specialist qualification.

Complaints in Progress

- (c) a complaint in relation to a chiropractor not complying with the registration requirements of holding PI Insurance.

 This complaint is currently under investigation.
- (e) a complaint in relation to a myropractor advertising under the chiropractors section of the yellow pages.

This complaint is currently being investigated.

(I) a complaint received by the Board was in relation a chiropractor over-servicing patients.

This complaint is currently under investigation by the Board's solicitors.

(g) a complaint in relation to a chiropractor's manner in dealing with the patient. The patient alleged the chiropractor used inappropriate comments, the patient was in pain during the adjustments and the chiropractor did not cease treatment when the patient advised they were in pain.

This complaint is currently being investigated.
