## Chairman's foreword

I am pleased to table the first annual report for the Community Development and Justice Standing Committee in the 40<sup>th</sup> Parliament.

This is a slightly different annual report in that it covers two parliamentary sessions. The 2017 State General Election took place during the 2016–17 financial year; therefore, the activities of both the Community Development and Justice Standing Committee of the 39<sup>th</sup> Parliament and the Community Development and Justice Standing Committee of the 40<sup>th</sup> Parliament are contained in this report.

I would like to acknowledge the admirable work of the Committee of the previous parliament. It not only tabled a major report, *Cultivating promise—Building Resilience and Engagement for At-Risk Youth through Sport and Culture*, but conducted a number of agency review hearings during the reporting period.

To some extent, the current Committee has expanded upon the work of the Committee of the 39<sup>th</sup> Parliament. In September 2016, that Committee held a hearing with the Western Australian Electoral Commission (WAEC) to ascertain its preparedness for the 2017 election. The Committee of the 40<sup>th</sup> Parliament followed-up with the WAEC to ascertain how the election went and whether there were any areas for improvement.

As a result of these investigations, the Committee decided to initiate an inquiry into the administration and management of the 2017 election. The Committee will assess the adequacy of WAEC procedures in relation to ballot security; the participation of communities with traditionally low levels of enrolment or turnout; the levels of informality; remote polling; the operation of polling places; and the general responsiveness of the *Electoral Act 1907*. Ultimately, the Committee wants to ensure that the electoral system is as robust as possible—that eligible voters are given adequate opportunity to cast their vote and all political parties and candidates able to have their policies and voices heard.

I look forward to working with my Committee colleagues in this parliament. Their contribution to our discussions and deliberations has been invaluable and I know that we have a productive year ahead of us.

# Chapter 1

## Committee activities

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### Introduction

The 2016–2017 reporting period encompasses two parliamentary sessions. The 39<sup>th</sup> Parliament was prorogued and Legislative Assembly dissolved by the Governor on Monday, 30 January 2017. This dissolution terminated the Legislative Assembly of the 39<sup>th</sup> Parliament and its committees. The Community Development and Justice Standing Committee of the 40<sup>th</sup> Parliament was established on Wednesday, 17 May 2017.

A summary of the activities of the Committee during the course of this reporting period—1 July 2016 to 30 June 2017—is in Table 1.1.

# Chapter 2

## Financial statement

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### Expenditure of the Committee during the financial year.

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The Committee does not have its own formal budget and is funded out of the budget of the Legislative Assembly. Approval for major expenditure is required on a case-by-case basis and is subject to the approval of the Speaker.

The Committee is required in accordance with Standing Order 276 to detail expenditure for the financial year 1 July 2016–30 June 2017. The Legislative Assembly dissolved on Monday, 30 January 2017 prior to the state election; therefore two Committees operated during the 2016–2017 financial year. # Appendix One

## Committee's functions and powers

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The functions of the Committee are to review and report to the Assembly on:

- a) the outcomes and administration of the departments within the Committee's portfolio responsibilities;
- b) annual reports of government departments laid on the Table of the House;
- c) the adequacy of legislation and regulations within its jurisdiction; and
- d) any matters referred to it by the Assembly including a bill, motion, petition, vote or expenditure, other financial matter, report or paper.

At the commencement of each Parliament and as often thereafter as the Speaker considers necessary, the Speaker will determine and table a schedule showing the portfolio responsibilities for each committee. Annual reports of government departments and authorities tabled in the Assembly will stand referred to the relevant committee for any inquiry the committee may make.

Whenever a committee receives or determines for itself fresh or amended terms of reference, the committee will forward them to each standing and select committee of the Assembly and Joint Committee of the Assembly and Council. The Speaker will announce them to the Assembly at the next opportunity and arrange for them to be placed on the notice boards of the Assembly.
